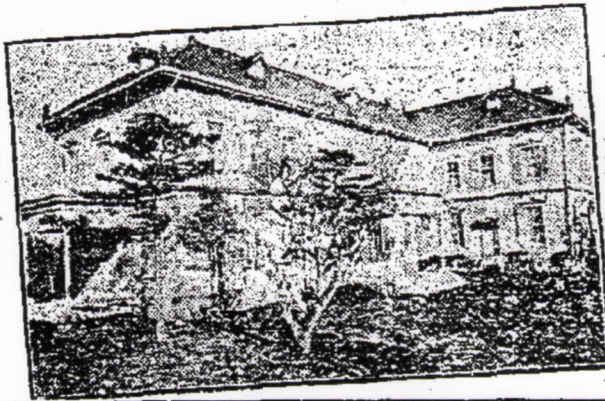

ASSOCIATION CONCORDIA MEET

AMERICA WILL NOT LIVE IF MATERIALISM WERE ALL.

A brilliant meeting took place at the Suyken, Ueno, last night, of the Association Concordia of Japan. The President of Harvard University was the guest of honor. After dinner, he addressed the meeting, saying that he came to Japan as an official representative of the Association Concordia of America, with its greetings to the members of the Japanese Association. He said, thinkers of the world today had called upon to solve the question whether the duty of nations would be decided by things material, commercial, material, or by things spiritual, ideal, and inward. A certain Japanese considered the Concordia movement as of no practical value, because it had no touch with the practical question of the day and its promoters were idealists. Dr. Peabody thought, however, that the material of nations might die, but the spiritual would live. He hoped, the Association Concordia, through co-operation between America and Japan, would make great progress in the spiritual uplifting of the world.

DEATH OF DR. M. KIMURA

VETERAN AND SAGE IN CLASSICAL LEARNING OF JAPAN

After an illness of some six months Dr. Masaburo Kimura, a well-known scholar of the Japanese classics, died at 1:50 in the afternoon of the 11th at his residence in Shinjuku. He was 87 years of age. He leaves a widow and two grand-children. Dr. Kimura was a native of Nishimatsu, Chiba prefecture, and early revealed his remarkable aptitude for reading which habit enabled him to get a complete knowledge of Japanese classical literature. He served the Tokugawa Government. Under the Imperial regime he was in 1869 commissioned to compile a Japanese history. In the establishment of the Imperial University he was chosen as professor of Japanese classics and was appointed in 1889 a member of the Tokyo Gakushuin. Two years later he became secretary of the Education Department and was also made professor of the Tokyo Higher Normal School. In 1893 he gave up all official connections and devoted himself to literary work. He wrote many books in interpretation of the Japanese classics, among which the best known is a series of lectures on the study of the "Manyoshu." He contributed many curious and rare volumes to the Household Department.

FIRE AT BLUFF, YOKOHAMA

HOMES OF MR. F. P. PRATT LOST

Fire broke out about 4 o'clock yesterday morning at the residence of Mr. F. P. Pratt at No. 22, Bluff, Yokohama, and resulted in the destruction of the building. 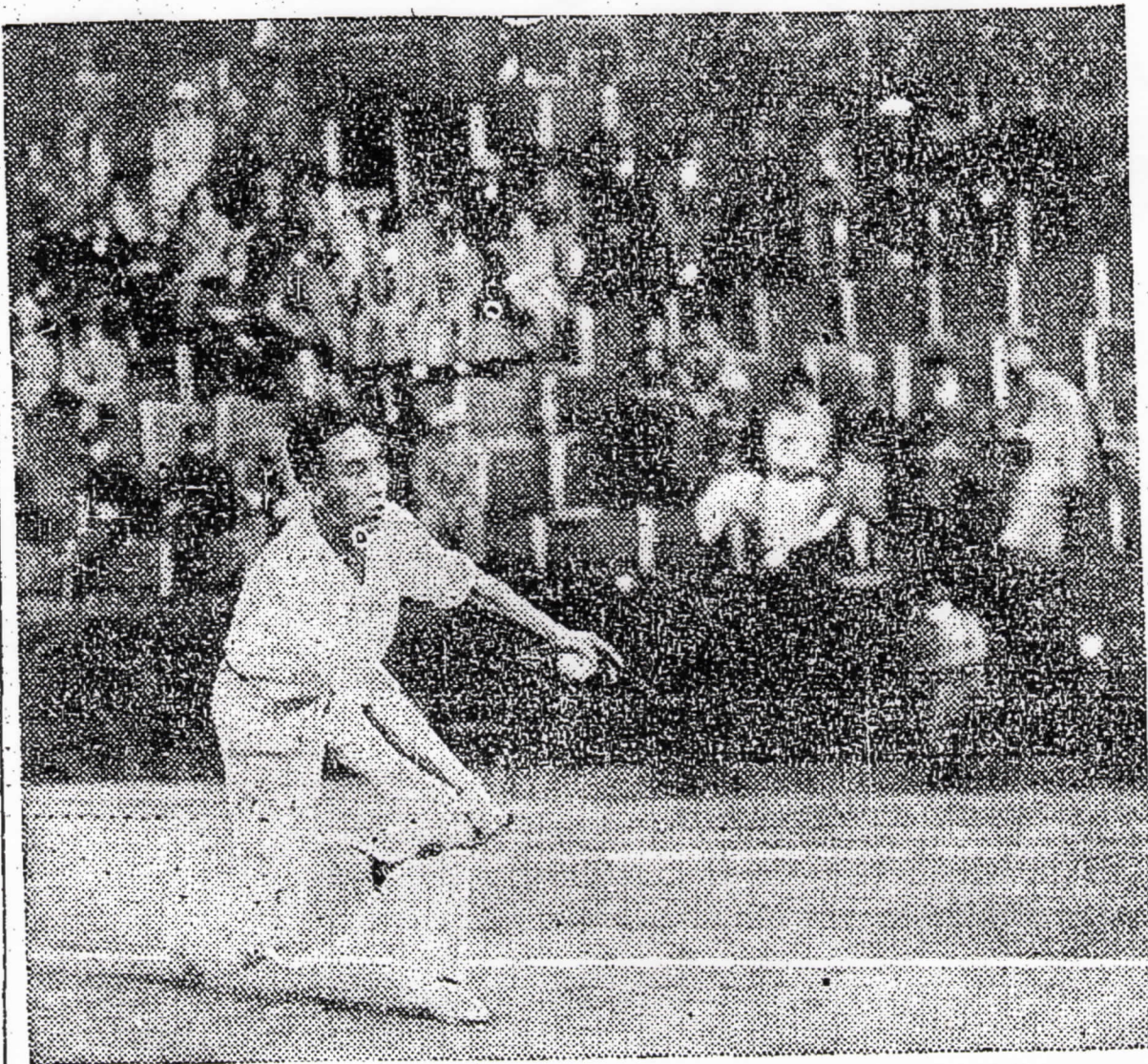

PREMIER'S SPEECH

(Continued From Page 1)

Members of the House of Representatives have already been extended through the adoption of the so-called Universal Suffrage Bill. The Government realizes the importance of extending the franchise to the local legislative assemblies. And intend to do so before the end of the year. At the same time, with a view to enable the local self-governing bodies to exercise their powers more freely, we plan to place our control over them. By these means, we trust that the political rights that can be enjoyed by the people may be brought to full fruition.

In fact, with the already extended rights of the people in the representative government and with the extension of their rights in local self-government now contemplated, it may be said that the foundation of the political system of our people will be broadened, and we consider that we ought to devote all our efforts to the reinforcement and solidification of the political and social life of the people. We need hardly say that we shall do our utmost for the development of various industries for the attainment of the goal of the subject, but we believe the extension of diverse social-political measures is also necessary. Therefore we have enlarged the scope of the measures hitherto in force and adopted new plans for the purpose of increasing production and development of foreign trade and also believe it is necessary to put in practice the health insurance law, which has been an outstanding question, have asked an appropriation for the necessary expenditure in the general estimate for the next fiscal year.

Labor Unions

Further, we realize the necessity of enacting the Labor Union Law and the Labor Dispute Arbitration Law and the revising of the Police Law, and will submit to your consideration during this Session Bills for these respective purposes. In sympathy with the trend of affairs at home and abroad, the labor question has markedly increased in importance of late years. The establishment of an adequate policy towards it constitutes one of the most important tasks of the Government today. The enactment of these laws will not only have a far-reaching effect on the people socially and economically and in their thoughts and ideas, and taking this into consideration, it may be inadvisable to carry these measures in their present form and enactment; the measures taken must, consequently be made appropriate to the conditions in our country. Accordingly, the Government has caused various administrative offices and organizations repeatedly and circumstantially to investigate and carefully weigh and discuss the problem.

Taxation

It goes without saying that there is also a necessity of carrying out a general readjustment of our taxation system. Although the question has been pending for many years, and the people have long desired that something should be done and successive Administrations have made inquiries into it, nothing has been done up till now.

Recognizing the necessity of readjusting our taxation system, the Government, after a long investigation and studied it, as was announced in the preceding session of the Diet, have now arrived at a concrete plan, so that such a readjustment will be completed by the end of the present Session together with the general revision for the fiscal year of 1927-1928. The contemplated readjustment of the taxation system covers almost all national taxes and, incidental to this situation and relation of our taxation system, the purpose of the readjustment of new taxes and increasing certain existing taxes in order to make good the deficit in revenue. The fundamental policy in view, however, aims at a readjustment of the taxation system in such a degree as will not give rise to any undue economic gain or loss in revenue, and looks rather to a fair sharing of the burden of the taxes upon the people, with the ulterior object of providing adequate welfare to the people from the social-political viewpoint. I believe that, in the economic conditions now obtaining in our country, this will largely contribute to the stabilization of the basis of our industry, and to the development of our industry generally. In addition, the readjustment will be carried out in the local taxation system on the same lines and with the identical aim as in the case of national taxes.

Optimistic

It is an incontrovertible fact that the economic life of the people, both public and private, has flourished in recent years. Upon the formation of the present Ministry at the Imperial command, I advocated the necessity of thrift and economy and industry on the part of the people as so to prepare for our economic development in the future and the Government carried into practice administrative and financial readjustments with your approval.

One and half years have passed since then, and it appears that they are producing beneficial results in economic and financial and other fields of national activity, which induces us to believe that our economic circle has now taken a turn for prosperity and activity.

However, should we relax our care and vigilance all our past endeavors would have been in vain. For the present, therefore, we shall still continue to adopt a policy of retrenchment and economy and lay necessary plans and take necessary measures for the reinforcement of our national power in accordance with the demand of the times. In the event of real recuperation and recovery of our national economy being attained in future, we shall have no hesitations to make adequate to such happy conditions and contribute thereby to the advancement of our national fortunes.

¥12 Million 'Just Loans,' Bar Hostess Tells Police

A Ginza bar hostess who disappeared with ¥12 million she had "borrowed" from the manager and customers surrendered to Tokyo police last night after learning she had been the object of a citywide man-hunt.



Shikuma

Michiko Shikuma, 35,—professionally known as Setsuko Chiba—had been missing since Oct. 30 from the bar where she worked, Mignon, on the Ginza.

Shikuma, accompanied by her lawyer, Toyozo Asayama, appeared at the Mita Police Station shortly after 8 p.m. yesterday expressing "surprise" to read from the newspapers that she was being sought as a criminal.

Since last August Michiko allegedly borrowed ¥1,700,000

from the bar proprietress, Shizue Miyata, on the pretext of paying for her father's funeral and her brother's wedding.

She borrowed an additional ¥10,606,000 from her customers, bar maids and liquor suppliers, police said.

Some customers were given credit checks as security on the loan, police said.

She told police that she borrowed the money from customers in order to set her father up in business as a tobacconist and also to pay for her younger brother's wedding fund.

The pretty hostess, who is married, denied she had any intention of deceiving creditors. She said she had just returned from Osaka and had been staying at the Kanko Hotel in Omori, Tokyo.

Her husband, whose name was not revealed, earlier told police he had no knowledge of her whereabouts.

Police have detained Shikuma on charges of swindling.
